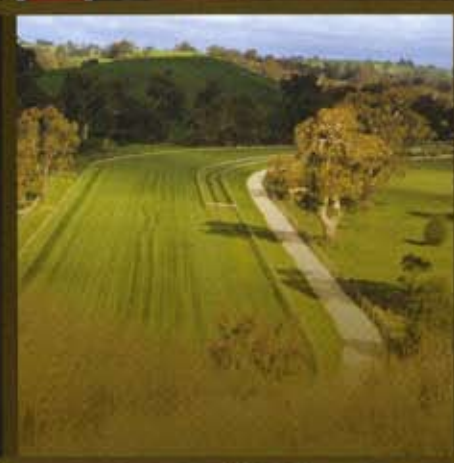
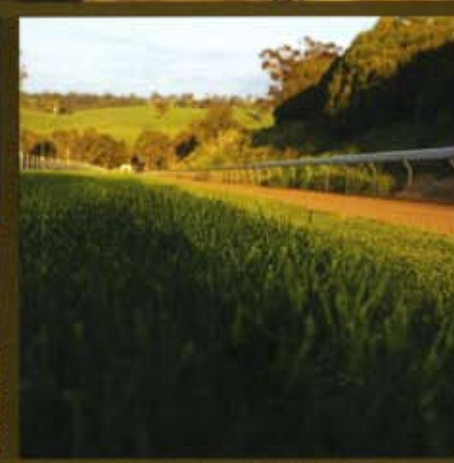
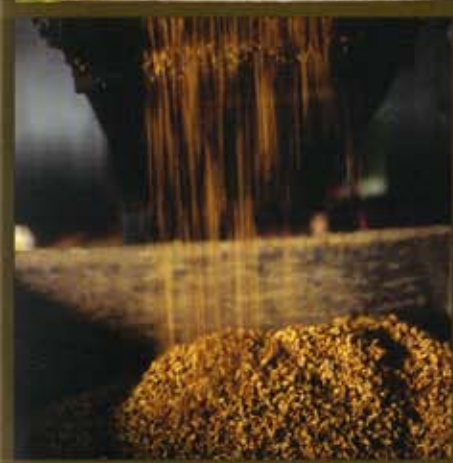

The Hayes family name is synonymous with success in the history books of Australia's thoroughbred racing industry.

Colin Hayes - The Visionary

Colin Hayes AM, O.B.E established Lindsay Park Racing Stable and Stud amongst the magnificent red gums and rolling hills of Barossa Valley, South Australia in 1965. This was a visionary move to take horses away from the traditional training circuit of the city track. But with intuition and a masterful plan, Colin Hayes developed a world-class training complex that today draws accolades from industry experts the world over. An ideal equine environment for breeding and training, it was the foundation of his success and now for the future success of son David.

The Hayes Dynasty

Colin Hayes loved horses. In a 43 year career he trained 5,333 winners inc. 524 Group or listed winners. His wins included two Melbourne Cups, four VRC Derbys, three Cox Plates, three Australian Cups, three Blue Diamonds, four Newmarket Hcps, a Caulfield Cup, a Sydney Cup and the Golden Slipper Stakes.

He established Lindsay Park, a dominant force in Australian racing. Home to some of Australia's most influential stallions inc.: Without Fear, Zabeel, At Talaq, Jeune and Rory's Jester. Dedicated to breeding, Colin Hayes with Robert Sangster, initiated the shuttle stallion into Australia. He established Lindsay Park Stud on his Angaston property, a stud that continues to flourish today under the eye of his grandson Sam Hayes.

the winning formula

David Hayes - The Beginning 1990

He was an instant success. At the helm of Lindsay Park for five years before leaving to train in Hong Kong, David won every Premiership in Melbourne and Adelaide. He was the first Australasian trainer to lead in 300 winners in a season, then setting a Commonwealth record and he set a world record of training six Group winners in one day at the one race meeting - Derby Day at Flemington.

He trained Jeune to win the Melbourne Cup for Sheikh Hamdan Bin Rashid Al Maktoum. Then going to where no Australian trainer had been before, he took his Cox Plate winning champ, Better Loosen Up across international seas to conquer the richest race in the world at that time - The Japan Cup - one of the world's most prestigious weight for age events.

David Hayes in Hong Kong

On the back of his outstanding achievements, David was issued the world coveted invitation to train in Hong Kong.

Arriving in 1996, he shot to the top of the trainers list. There he remained, winning two Hong Kong Premierships and ranking amongst the top four every season for the next nine years, training 458 winners to earn HK\$436,269,137 in prizemoney. He became the "benchmark" Hong Kong trainer of his era.

His versatility as a trainer saw him score wins in Hong Kong's major events from The Hong Kong Sprint to the Hong Kong Derby, The Stewards Cup and the Hong Kong Classic Mile. His achievements and popularity, stamped his name in the history of Hong Kong racing.

While in Hong Kong, David's brother, Peter took the reins and continued the winning momentum for Lindsay Park securing four Melbourne Premierships and five Adelaide Premierships until his tragic death in 2001. Long time assistant trainer Tony McEvoy immediately stepped in to train, and took Lindsay Park to a further three Adelaide Premierships and one Melbourne Premiership prior to David returning from Hong Kong.



David enjoyed spectacular success in his first season back and made an immediate impact on Australian racing stamping his dominance as the nation's leading two-year-old trainer.

Returning to Australia in July 2005, David burst back onto the scene winning with his first runner. David Hayes was back!

Within a week he trained a stakes winner and then a Gr 1 winner - Barely A Moment – now a multiple Gr 1 winner standing at Lindsay Park Stud.

David enjoyed spectacular success in his first season back and made an immediate impact on Australian racing. He trained more than 234 individual winners and took Lindsay Park's overall tally of winners to over 9,000.

He finished the season as leading Australian trainer of stakes winners - 27, leading trainer of individual Group 1 performers (9) and emphatically stamped his dominance as the nation's leading trainer of two-year-olds by winning the nation's premier two-year-old races - Sydney's Golden Slipper with Miss Finland and Melbourne's Blue Diamond Stakes with Nadeem. His juvenile juggernaut produced 45 individual 2yo winners including 15 individual stakes winners, clearly establishing him on top of the two-year-old trainer's list.

Lindsay Park Racing Stables at Flemington, Melbourne

Flemington Racecourse is home to Australia's most famous race "The Melbourne Cup", and the scene of many great racing achievements for the Hayes family. Lindsay Park's metropolitan facility for the David Hayes Racing Stable is located on this course.

A practical training complex designed in 1998 by the late Colin Hayes, it comprises 60 stables, walking machines, sand rolls, wash bays, pastured paddocks as well as a racing office with client entertainment areas.

This complex facilitates David Hayes' horses for a Melbourne racing campaign. In Sydney, Lindsay Park owns 8 private stables on Randwick Racecourse.

Lindsay Park has the best of both worlds - luxurious, yet practical country and city facilities, utilised to suit individual needs of individual horses. In house horse transportation on Lindsay Park floats operates directly between the facilities minimizing travel time.

Creightons Creek, Euroa

The David Hayes-owned and developed property near Euroa, country Victoria, is known as "Creightons Creek" and operates under the business name of Creightons Creek Bloodstock. This business is owned and run by David's nephew Tom Dabernig who trains in his own right, and business partner Warren Sutton, expert horse-breaker.

A mini Lindsay Park of 435 hectares amongst rolling hills and the serenity of the country, it comprises an all-weather uphill training track and modern stable complex. Warren breaks in all yearlings purchased by David Hayes and outside interests and pre-trains racehorses for both David, Tom and outside clients.

Creightons Creek can accommodate up to 80 horses in training and has the availability of 18 day paddocks for racehorses to relax and make full use of this beautiful country environment.
